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NSW - Celebrating 40 Years of Friendship & Support

St Anthony's in the Fields, Terrey Hills*

Our Family Group began as the Carroll Family Group 40 years ago. Initially there were 10 Families and 2 Single ladies in the Group. Paul and Shirley were our Leaders and guides and welcomed everyone. The group expanded over the years until there were a total of 34 regularly attending our Monthly events. Diane and Ken Munro became Co Leaders and so the Group became the Carroll / Munro Family Group.

We had planning meetings and everyone had a say in the next year's activities offering to host dinners, picnics, walks etc. These sometimes chaotic meetings achieved varied and popular pursuits enthusiastically attended by all. Weekends away were very important and well attended for many years. Children from pre-schoolers to teenagers took part in the beginning but as they grew up this inevitably dwindled. All still have fond memories of when they were involved. Our Schedule always included a Home Mass celebrated by Fr Peter McGrath and by subsequent Passionist Priests, a great privilege for us.

St Anthony's at the time was a very vibrant Parish and bi-annually we had either a "Winter Madness Concert" or a Parish Fair. Our group were enthusiastic actors in both scenarios with several 'stars' emerging. It all helped to 'bond' us as a family.

On a more serious note we have always fulfilled the purpose of the Family Groups to support each other in times of trouble and sadness. Over the years, three teenage suicides were a terrible shock and a challenge to our capacity to offer support. However we did and hopefully made a difference, sharing the families' grief. Various illnesses were suffered and several deaths have come our way. Our group has now reduced to 4 couples and 6 singles most of advanced age and so we now meet monthly for a Lunch together.

I think this story illustrates how a Family Group has been an intrinsic part of all our lives and for many of us, half of our lifetime and counting.

Queensland - Holy Spirit Parish, Bray Park - celebrates 30 years

Holy Spirit Parish just north of Brisbane is ministered to by the Spiritan Missionary Order*.

On May 19 this year, about 50 Family Group members gathered at a local Tavern for a luncheon to celebrate 30 years of PFGM involvement in the parish's 50-year history. Back in May 1994, Parish Priest Fr Gerry Gogan and assistant priest Fr Paul Walch invited a Passionist team to speak at Sunday Masses with a sign-up weekend. Sixty-four families joined including 154 children and 13 singles. They were placed into five Family Groups.

Under the guidance of the extended archdiocesan PFGM community and its aims, the families readily took to the Movement with great energy and enthusiasm with an average of eight new families added each year for the next eleven years and a sixth group formed. Being young families, in the first nine years, five sports & fun days were arranged at the school grounds with a colour allocated to each group and a trophy awarded for the winning team at the end of the day. Such events as sack race, potato and spoon race and three-legged race brought plenty of fun and enjoyment.

Apart from yearly week-end camps and monthly functions, the Family Groups and individual members played a significant role in the life of the Parish, particularly in the first twenty years with the launch of a FG Cook Book, bush dances, Australia Day celebrations at the local dam, Parish Christmas dinners, Jubilee Year Pilgrimage, fund raising for the Spiritan missions, bike and kayak rides as well as celebrating births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and giving bereavement support.

Now, the parish is more multicultural with only two active Family Groups in the Parish but for the members of the groups that have closed, they remain lifelong friends. Fr Rogasian Msami, a priest in the parish for eleven years, attended the luncheon and shared how Family Groups helped him to become a part of the Australian culture after coming from a small village in Tanzania. Fr Edward Khaemba, newly appointed parish priest, also attended the 30-year celebration lunch.

The Movement came into the parish at an opportune time when there were many young families anxious to be involved in community building activities. Over the 30 years of the Holy Spirit's 50-year history, the Movement has contributed greatly to the life of the parish.

It IS a Family for All

It seems many PFG members give little thought to the fact that living Family Group life is living gospel life. Behind the picnics, dinners, fun activities and other (social) get togethers, is the reality that all of these activities are being shared with people who were once strangers.

Hardly anyone chose their Family Group. Members were allocated at random and twenty, thirty or forty years later they have truly become a family in the sense that Jesus would have invited them to be.

One stated aim of the PFGM is to build community in the parish and the network of families who have come to know and appreciate each other are doing that, and they are caring for members who are troubled or unwell, sharing good times, and including people who might otherwise have been excluded.

It is frustrating when people who don't belong suggest a Passionist Family Group is a social group. Even some individual groups settle for that narrow understanding of who they really are. There are forty meals recorded in the gospels at which Jesus was present, and some of his most significant encounters occurred on those occasions. Through him, social became truly religious. Outcasts were invited to join, people were healed, and everywhere there was a clear sense that anyone could belong – women, Samaritans, Syro-Phoenicians, children, blind, lame, tax-collectors. As Pope Francis would say, "Everyone, everyone, everyone".

So how about celebrating that our 'family for all' is one way of joining the discipleship of Jesus and along the road, we learn what that really means and what it calls us to. It is so much more than 'just social'.




Carol Gweneth O'Reilly

John Buchan - father of Trish Gurney. Trish, with her husband Roger, is a member of both the PFGM's National Coordinating Team and the PFGM's Southern Team (Victoria and Tasmania). Trish's dad died on May 15, 2024. Unfortunately, Trish was unable to be present at her father's funeral in England.

Here, Trish writes of her father's very interesting life:



'Dad was born in Bath, England on 16 April 1931 and died in Ashley, England on 15 May 2024.

As a young boy, Dad and his sister were sent to boarding school, as their parents had a dental surgery and lived in Bath, which was bombed during WW2.

From the age of 10, Dad helped out on a farm during his holidays. On one memorable occasion, he drove a tractor into Bath, with the police turning a blind eye! On another occasion he fell under the roller of the tractor but luckily landed in a furrow so was unharmed.

Dad was unable to follow his first dream of becoming a Vet but, instead, studied agronomy and agriculture before setting off to Northern Rhodesia as a 21 year old to manage a farm. This was far from any town. Dad was unable to speak any local languages but he learnt the common language used in Southern Africa and made himself popular by ministering to the locals' sick and wounded animals using supplies his dad and aunt had sent with him. He loved all animals and had no fear of any of them.

Dad then moved to the Copperbelt and undertook some of the more dangerous mining jobs to earn enough to buy a farm in Southern Rhodesia. He was motivated to do so as he had met Mum and hoped to marry. The two had fallen in love at their first meeting.


Unfortunately he was swindled, the victim of a conman. The farm that Dad had bought had no water! So, once again, he began a new pursuit - this time in insurance. He worked and studied and became General Manager of three provinces in Zimbabwe.

Dad was devastated when mum died in 1997 but a couple of years later he re-married and he and his new wife relocated to England after the situation in Zimbabwe had deteriorated. He had never wanted to return to the UK as he loved Africa.

Dad was hard-working, honest and fair. He believed in working for the community and he always supported charities, without wanting acknowledgement. This attitude earned him the respect and admiration of all those who knew him. Dad also had a great sense of humour (which saved us a few times when we three children got up to mischief!)

Money and power were never his gods as he had a deep faith, which he practised as an Anglican.'

* Trish & Roger moved from Zimbabwe to settle in Australia in December 2003.


They joined a Family Group at Our Lady of the Pines Parish in Donvale and, more recently, have become valued members of the Southern & National PFGM Teams.

Thank you Mrs Prager



Many will be aware that Mrs Margarete Prager, who died on 4 March 2005, left a substantial bequest to the Passionist Family Group Movement in her Will.

Mrs Prager's generosity was particularly amazing because she was neither a member of our Movement nor, for that matter, was she Catholic.

Mrs Prager's generous bequest has greatly assisted in the administration of the Movement for the past 18 years; however, the liquid proceeds of the Prager Fund are diminishing, and we now have sufficient to finance our operation for only the next 2 – 3 years.

Prior to Mrs Prager's bequest the Movement was financed from parish contributions, the efforts of volunteers, donations from benefactors and contributions from the Holy Spirit Province of the Passionists.

Over time, parish contributions have diminished greatly, our volunteers have aged considerably, benefactors are virtually non-existent and the Province's finances are under increasing strain. Despite this, our Movement continues to function in well over 100 parishes throughout Australia and New Zealand.

Accordingly, the National Leadership Team has decided to open a bank account, specifically for the receipt of donations. It is hoped that others, like Mrs Prager, will wish to support the good work of our Movement in building parish communities, enabling parishioners to get to know and love each other as Jesus taught us and in giving example to our children.

Family Groups provide a nurturing environment that helps people get to know other members of their parish community and to support one another. Many people within Family Groups have witnessed and received blessings from the love and acceptance they have experienced within their Family Group.
